


A visit with Marcia James...


When I was nine, I decided I was going to be a zoologist when I grew up, but not just any old zoologist. I was going to train animals for television and movies. I wanted to work for Ivan Tors, the man behind shows like *Flipper* and *Clarence the Cross-eyed Lion*. (Yes, I'm definitely showing my age here!)



I had several pets growing up, including turtles and a frisky Brittany spaniel. Unfortunately, we discovered that not only did my mother have serious allergies to pet dander, but my sister, brother and myself had inherited the allergies. So today I have a virtual pet, Smokey, my Chinese crested hairless dog logo.



I've written stories and poems almost as long as I've loved animals, so in college I changed my focus from science to creative writing. I worked as a freelance scriptwriter and advertising copy writer for years, before trying my hand at romance writing. Now I can combine penning happy endings (and kissyface scenes!) with the opportunity to write fictional four-legged characters.



My first book, *At Her Command* (<http://www.marciajames.net/books.html>), explores the question: What might happen if the DEA, FBI, and D.C. police unknowingly put operatives undercover at the same sex club? This humorous romantic suspense includes a tiny Chinese crested who works for the DEA as a drug-sniffing dog. I love writing about “cresties” because of the comic contrast between tough, Alpha-male heroes and tiny, frou-frou dogs. Here’s a photo of what author Jennifer Crusie would call the “gold standard” for cresties, who often win the World’s Ugliest Dog contests.



An acquaintance offered her crestie show dog for my PR photo. Here’s the result snapped between sneezes—mine, not the dog’s.



The photo was taken at a dog show, which reminded me of the “mockumentary” movie, *Best in Show*. I’m a sucker for movies with animals in them—e.g., *Marley & Me*, *The Truth About Cats and Dogs*, and *Must Love Dogs*—and TV shows like *Frasier* with its Jack Russell terrier.
